





Death of Carolyn Slippern



Carolyn Elaine Frantz was born in Big Run, PA, on 8 Oct 1939, to Charles Frantz and Bess Laird. At the age of 3, her family moved to Richland, WA, for her father's work on the Manhattan Project; and she stayed a Richland resident for the rest of

her life. She graduated from WSU and UW, obtaining a BA in Social Studies and a Masters in Librarianship. She taught at Park Junior High School in Kennewick, earning her Masters during evenings and summers. She met her future husband, William 'Stan' Slippern, at a folk dance at the Richland Community Center, and they were married 12 Nov 1966 at West Side Church. Carolyn was a homemaker while her children were young, later worked as the children's librarian at the Richland Public Library and also taught pre-school at West Side. She was an avid quilter, reader, genealogist and bird watcher. Family was forefront for her—vacations, holiday get-togethers, and church activities. Most of all, she loved God, and was an active church member. She cherished a small church group and hosted it weekly until her death. She died at Kadlec Hospital on 10 Apr 2016, surrounded by her family. Surviving her are her loving husband of 49 years; their son, Eric Slippern and his wife, daughter, Jennifer Sally: Nuzum: grandchildren Derek, Isaac, and Keira. At Carolyn's request, there was no memorial service.

Irish History 100 Years Ago

For those of you with Irish roots, it was 100 years ago that the Easter Rising of 1916 began a chain of events that led to Irish independence. The rebellion was an armed insurrection launched by Irish republicans to end British rule in Ireland and establish an independent Irish Republic during the time that the UK was heavily engaged in World War I. Organized by a 7-man Military Council of the Irish Republican Brotherhood, the Rising began on Easter Monday, 24 Apr 1916, and lasted for 6 days. With much greater numbers and heavier weapons, the British Army suppressed the Rising, the country remained under martial law, and about 3,500 people were taken prisoner by the British with most of the leaders executed. Almost 500 people were killed including 54% civilians, 30% British military and police, and 16% Irish rebels. More than 2,600 were wounded. Many of the civilians were killed by the use of heavy British artillery and machine guns, or mistaking civilians for rebels. Others were caught in the crossfire in a crowded city. The shelling and the fires it caused left parts of inner city Dublin in ruins. By Dec 1918, the independence of the Irish Republic was declared, which led to the War of Independence.

Next try a location where they lived (city, county, or just the state), gender, age range, or birthplace to filter out names that don't match. Remember you can also use asterisk wildcards, so Google that if you're not familiar.

U.S. Census History

There has been a U. S. Census taken once every 10 years since 1790, but due to privacy laws, censuses are not released to the public until 72 years later. So the most recent census available is the 1940 U.S. Census. The 1950 U.S. Census won't be released until 1 April 2022. The United States was actually the first nation in the world that made the census a mandatory part of its Constitution. The primary purpose was originally to apportion each state's seats in the House of Representatives. After centuries of population growth, the government decided to cap the size of Congress at 435 records after the 1910 census. Today, the census is the largest non-military operation undertaken by the U.S. government. Thanks to the census records, genealogists can find the household of every member of the U.S. population. OK, not every member, but about 90% of the population was successfully obtained. You probably already know that most of the records from the 11th U.S. Census taken in June 1890 were lost in a fire in 1921 when they were stored in the basement of the Commerce Building. The fire was reportedly started by a burning cigarette, and the improperly stored records were destroyed in the smoke, flames and water as firemen put out the blaze. Still, there are other surviving records from that time period, so it's just a matter of tracking down other records that still exist.

Overcome the Lost 1890 Census

Newspapers— You're bound to find evidence of your ancestors in the newspapers between 1881 and 1899. Newspapers are especially important in explaining household changes between census records. You may find evidence of a death, marriage or other important event that explains why someone left the household between 1880 and 1900. The good news with newspapers is that there were plenty of local papers around in 1890. It's best to begin searching as locally as possible, because hometown papers tended to have the most room to cover local happenings.

PERSI—Of course, there's always something useful in the Periodical Source Index! If you're not familiar with PERSI, come to our TCGS meeting on 14 Sep 2016, and listen to **Susan Davis Faulkner** explain this powerful resource.




