

Senate Bill 5332 on Vital Records

On 4 Mar 2019, our State Senate passed the substitute bill and sent it to the House. This Bill limits access to certified copies of birth and death records to qualified applicants and authorizes the Department of Health to amend specified vital records and transfer custody of them to the state archives. The bill allows for informational copies of birth records and death records to remain publicly available as they are now, except for the cause of death. CeCe Moore Identifies Murderers with DNA

CeCe Moore, the most experienced genetic genealogist in the world, was hired to connect DNA from long-ago murder scenes to suspects. This is her sort of riddle, mixing genetics, census records, and Facebook friend lists. She uses direct-toconsumer DNA tests to find the parents of adoptees, foundlings abandoned in dumpsters, and 'war children' fathered during conflicts. She has solved hundreds of cases of unknown parentage. In April 2018, California police revealed they had used DNA profiles to find the Golden State Killer, a notorious serial rapist and murderer active in the 1970s. Moore was not involved, but it was a break she'd been waiting for, and 2 weeks later, a company specializing in forensics, Parabon NanoLabs, announced it would form a 'genetic genealogy unit' with Moore as its chief. Give Parabon DNA from an old blood stain or rape kit, and Moore tries to find who it belongs to. In May 2018, she fingered the killer in a 1987 double murder. It took her only 2 days! She believes she knows the solution to several more murders. Announcements could come at any time.



Westward Expansion Trails

Brief History of Grand Coulee Dam



The construction of Grand Coulee Dam was a boon Washington for State and entire USA, but did vou realize that many little settlements along the river were

drowned and many, many cemeteries and grave sites were forever buried beneath the water? Here's a quote from a Spokesman Review article on 25 March 1939:

"Undertakers of the state will vie with one another this spring for the biggest mass burial contract in the history of the state. Bids will be called soon for the removal of a thousand graves of Indians and whites within the area to be flooded by Columbia River backwater above Grand Coulee Dam. The plan calls for giving the contract to a licensed undertaker. He and a crew of men (preference is to be given to Indian workmen) will dig up the remains along the river shore. Most of the Indian remains will be taken to main Indian cemeteries at Keller and Inchelium. Heirs of white people have been notified of the removal plans. The Bureau will re-bury their relatives in graves nearby, or if it is desired to move the remains to burial grounds far away, the Bureau will deliver the caskets to relatives.







More Land Record Tips

Land records offer more than just information about buying and selling land. They may hold clues to the whereabouts of family members or they may allude to past military service. Depending on how a given family came into possession of the land originally, the whole story may not appear in land records which are usually found at the County Courthouse.

- As new counties were created, they did not take any records with them, so there may be a parent county to search.
- You need to look in the grantor (seller) and grantee (buyer) indexes. Some counties have combined indexes of both grantor and grantee, but usually you have to look in several different volumes to be sure you have exhausted all possibilities with the land records for that county.
- If your ancestor acquired land through the Homestead Act, then you will need to turn to the National Archives in Washington, DC. Note that these records have not been microfilmed and they are not available anywhere else. To request a copy of the homestead file, first request the NATF Form 84, Land Entry Files, and complete that form. But you need to know the land office and the final certificate number, which is in the land records when the land was being sold.
- If you have more acres bought than were sold, you need to turn your attention to probate records. There are instances where the land was distributed through probate records usually found in the County Courthouse where the event occurred. [2001 tips from Rhonda R McClure.]



ARE YOUR SAVED RECORDS SAFE?

Most people who keep their family tree on Ancestry regularly attach records/images to an individual in their tree using the 'Save to a person in my tree' function, thinking they have really saved the record to their tree, and it will be there forever and ever. Not true. What has really happened was a link was created from their tree to that record/image in a database. So if you quit subscribing to Ancestry, you will still have access to your family tree kept there, but you will no longer be able to view any record/image attachments that were saved from a paid database, which most are. The bottom line, if these records/images are important to you, "Save to someone in my tree" as you have been doing, but also use the "Save to my computer" function. Name the record/image file you saved something meaningful, so it can easily be identified later, and keep it organized in a folder on your computer. A good practice might be to create a folder on your computer for each of your family surnames. [Former SGS Tip of the Week]

What Else Can I Do with My DNA Test Results?

After receiving DNA results from 23andMe, Family Tree DNA, or AncestryDNA, there is more information available. Below are some of the most popular and well-known tools (apps, extensions, programs, and websites) for getting more out of your raw data. Note that these have not all been verified.

- 23++ (http://23pp.david-web.co.uk/about/) (FREE) An extension for the Google Chrome web browser that adds additional functionality to the 23andMe website. The extension especially adds a number of features to Relative Finder.
- 529andYou (http://goo.gl/FQSiwW) (FREE) An extension for the Google Chrome web browser that works with 23andMe's Family Inheritance: Advanced tool (found under Ancestry Labs or, in the new beta website design, under My Results, Ancestry Tools) to collect information about DNA matches. The information, which includes shared segment data, is stored in a local database on your computer.
- David Pike's Utilities

(FREE) A comprehensive suite of tools for analyzing raw data, including searching for Runs of Homozygosity (ROHs), searching for shared DNA in two files, and several advanced phasing tools.

- DNAGedcom (http://www.dnagedcom.com)
 (FREE) A suite of tools for 23andMe and Family Tree DNA customers. User can download matches, shared segments, and other data into a handy spreadsheet for further analysis.
- **GEDmatch** (http://gedmatch.com/) (FREE) A powerful suite of tools for 23andMe, AncestryDNA, and Family Tree DNA raw data. Users can compare their DNA to everyone else in the database or to a specific individual in the database, or perform numerous admixture analyses, phase their DNA, and much more.
- Genes & Us (http://www.genesand.us) (FREE)
 A website for 23andMe users to "combine their genomes in order to better understand what disease risks most affect their family." For example, a mother and father can link their 23andMe accounts to the site and determine the possible combinations for their children's DNA. Appears to work with 23andMe's new API offering.
